Water Quality Monitoring Joint Venture in Somerset County

The Somerset Conservation District, Kiski-Conemaugh Stream Team and the United States Geological Survey (USGS) are embarking on a Water Quality Monitoring Joint Venture in Somerset County. This initiative is designed to utilize technology to determine changes in water quality in every major Somerset County watershed.

The USGS currently has several stations in place that can monitor for water chemistry and will retrofit several others to do so. The District, with support from the Stream Team, has identified additional locations where in stream data loggers should be placed that will provide additional information. Although the primary impetus for the project is the potential impacts from Marcellus Shale gas drilling, the data derived from this effort will provide us information about potential impacts from abandoned mine

drainage (AMD), agriculture and other sources of impairment.

The minimal number of data loggers required to cover the identified need is five. Each logger costs \$1,500.00 each. The District and the Stream Team will provide the people power required to gather the information from the loggers that will record information continuously. Local Universities and other partners will be approached to provide additional data gathering assistance.

In order to more fully protect the water resources of Somerset County additional loggers will be required to support or expand the program. The District is currently approaching watershed groups, conservation organizations, local businesses and gas companies for financial support. Eventually grant funds will be pursued to expand the program beyond Somerset County. To date the Somerset County Conservancy, Mountain Laurel Chapter of Trout Unlimited, Jenner Rod and Gun Club and the Chestnut Ridge Chapter of Trout Unlimited have financially contributed to this initiative.

This effort will provide a crucial early warning system for our watersheds and is a proactive approach as opposed to reacting to a problem after it is too late to correct.

AMD Treatment System Snapshot–Part II

In September, a team consisting of individuals from PA DEP's Bureau of Abandoned Mine Reclamation (BAMR), Kiski-Conemaugh Stream Team, Stream Restoration Incorporated, and others conducted a snapshot of all the publicly funded passive treatment systems located within Pennsylvania. This snapshot collected water quality data, photographs, and sketches that will be placed on Datashed, a free, web-based database designed to assist in the management of data related to passive treatment systems. Datashed makes this information available to the public, including watershed groups, academic, non-profits, government agencies and anyone else interested in passive treatment. Data may be viewed at www.datashed.org. Phase II of the snapshot will take place in late March and April to gather water quality data from passive treatment systems during the season of high flows. These data will be added to Datashed this summer. The Kiski-Conemaugh Stream Team will need a few extra volunteers to help with this additional monitoring. Stream Team Annual Report Available

A digital copy of the Kiski-Conemaugh Stream Team's first official annual report is available upon request by contacting Melissa Reckner, the Stream Team's director, at 814-444-2669 or <u>mreckner@kcstreamteam.org</u>. This report details the Stream Team's accomplishments in 2009 and nicely shows the extent of its programs. For instance, the Stream Team collected 528 water samples from 157 throughout the 1,887 square-mile Kiski-Conemaugh River Basin. It regularly monitored 26 AMD treatment systems in which over 10 million, of largely public dollars, have

been invested. Resulting data were used by numerous federal, state and local agencies to design and evaluate Abandoned Mine Drainage treatment systems. If not for the Stream Team and its partnership with the PA DEP's Bureau of Abandoned Mine Reclamation, many of these systems would not be monitored,



jeopardizing the investment of countless resources, leaving a huge data gap, and endangering aquatic species that are returning and flourishing in our waterways. Additionally, even with its reduced staff, the Stream Team directly engaged and educated 5,935 students of all ages through its environmental education program, which included six Trout in the Classroom projects and Outdoor Adventures. Over 300 people volunteered with the Stream Team in 2009, and \$0.88 of every dollar leveraged went directly into conservation and education programs.

New Growth at Natural Biodiversity

Our 10-year old program is becoming an organization, recently securing a 7-member board of directors and filing articles of incorporation. We are also currently releasing our 2009 Annual Report and working on plenty of spring stewardship offerings, from Outdoor Heritage Month activities in April, featuring a screening of the movie *Food, Inc.* on April 8th, 7pm, Johnstown Flood Museum, to the new *Native Plant Fest of the Alleghenies*, featuring native plant sales, family backyard habitat workshops, and a keynote presentation by Doug Tallamy, author of <u>Bringing</u> <u>Nature Home</u>.
